

Since our inception in 2014, the Barlow Foundation has demonstrated a steadfast commitment to our vision of a better world, providing opportunities for all to thrive. However, this has been no simple feat.

Looking back to Look Forward highlights the dedication that has been integral to our success over the last 5 years.

In that short time, by the completion of this present financial year, we will have granted over \$4.3 million to more than 30 not-for-profit organisations.

This report covers the full scope of the Foundation's 5-year journey, from funding the paving of a small catch up school in Cambodia to becoming leaders in the field of impact investing.

With words from our passionate board, overviews of where, what, and how we give, and visual representations of growth, *Looking Back to Look Forward* seeks to provide a holistic understanding of how our young but strong foundation has risen to the position it holds today.

Established in 2014, the Barlow Foundation is inspired by founder Bev Barlow, whose beginnings as a teacher in Papua New Guinea in 1961 and a lifetime of giving underpins our guiding principle of self-improvement through self-empowerment.

The Barlow Foundation is a grant provider and impact investor that seeks to help people improve their lives through economic empowerment and education programs.

We deliver grants to organisations that work towards balancing inequality in Australia and the Asia-Pacific, with a particular focus on women and children. We believe this to be the key to addressing social inequality. In order to achieve this, we utilise impact investing alongside grant giving to ensure our impact is 100% socially beneficial.

Ultimately, our priority is to allow others the opportunity to thrive, finding their way out of disadvantage and towards self determination, happiness and success.

CEO REMARKS

"Asking 'how can we have the greatest possible impact?' has always been my driving question."

It started as conversations between mum, (Bev Barlow) and I. She had been very generous throughout her life, but wanted to do more, she wanted to be more formalized and thoughtful with her giving. So we set up a Private Ancillary Fund and Bev committed to seed fund it with 20 million dollars. I then established the governance structure with my siblings and our financial advisor, Greg Neave to be our board. We then began the work of who we would benefit through our giving.

I had read 'Half The Sky' by Nicholas D Kristof and Sheryl Wudunn and knew that women, through a hand up, not a hand out can change the course of their lives, their children's lives and their communities lives. I also came to appreciate the philosophy of helping them to help themselves through my own children's Montessori education. The path seemed clear.

The board met and debated. There was much to decide, who, how, where...but working together, backed by extensive research and a lot of conferences we did decide and in our first year proudly gave \$300 000 away to education and economic empowerment programs that benefited women and children in Australia and overseas. As the CEO with support from the family head office, I administered this from my kitchen table. I travelled with my husband Martin throughout Australia and Asia, meeting people, learning about programs, seeing what works and what doesn't. All the while determining where we can have the greatest possible impact.

Asking 'how can we have the greatest possible impact?' has always been my driving question. How can we do more, be better and truly effect real change in the lives of others?

A trusted advisor, Kate Kennedy, who was CEO of Hagar at the time helped me to fine tune the application process and how to assess the programs we supported. In 2018, she became our first outside hire and joined us on the board. Martin McKenna, my husband, joined the board after Chris Barlow resigned his position in 2017 as it is a guiding principle that we have strong family representation on the board at all times.

In 2017 we got an office, and I even had an assistant. We now had a strong passionate board with diverse views, an office in which to meet, and a very clear strategy for growth and improvement for the next 5 years.

I could not be prouder of what we have done in the first 5 years of The Barlow Foundation, giving away more than 4 million dollars and investing 4 times that in to social change-makers. As we continue to grow in size, we also grow in maturity, we now know how to have an impact, but we will continue to ask the question – how can we have the greatest possible impact?

And then do that.




Kate is a leader in the private, government and non-profit sectors.

THE BEGINNING

Our journey of giving started with the funding of a 'Catch-up School' (pictured left) with partner *Hagar* in Phnom Penh, Cambodia in 2014.


This grant enables primary-aged children who have had their lives and education interrupted by slavery to reach the academic and social levels of their peers. This is achieved through intensive schooling tailored to young boys and girls affected by the trauma of bonded labour.

The building of *Hagar's* 'Catch up School' acted as a launchpad, establishing the Barlow Foundation's core values of self-empowerment through the basic human right of education, regardless of an individuals background.



BY THEME





In partnership with Ardoch, we have assisted in building language and literacy in playgroups and disadvantaged communities in Victoria.

Partnering with Western Chances, school children in Victoria's western suburbs have been granted merit-based scholarships to reach their academic goals.



We gave our support to Reading Out of Poverty to teach migrant mothers in Dandenong of the importance of literacy for their children.



We have partnered with *The Cathy Freeman Foundation* to deliver the 'Hippy' program on Palm Island, an initiative which prepares indigenous pre-schoolers for school.












IM PACT IN VESTING

Impact investing is the investment of capital with the goal of generating a positive social or environmental impact alongside a financial return.

In 2016, we made the decision to commit ourselves to the goal of 100% impact/ESG exposure, in order to leverage the overall power of our capital.

The Barlow Foundation's use of impact investing is crucial in answering our fundamental question; how can we have the greatest possible impact? By considering the outcomes of everything what we do, we ensure our impact on the world is only beneficial.



In 2014, the Barlow Foundation discovered the power of impact investing as a way to increase our impact, by June 2016 we had made our first impact investment, and in two and a half short years we went from 2% to 76% invested in ESG and impact.

We want to capacity build organisations so that they can be in a stronger position to achieve their missions and we seek to invest in organisations that are tackling important issues to bring about social change.

We are now therefore an impact group and as we embark on our future we are thinking BIG.
